Poplar is a rural community nestled in the northwestern corner of the state of Wisconsin, just miles from the shores of the largest freshwater lake in the entire world—beautiful Lake Superior. Although we are only a small village surrounded by similar villages and townships, we are within a 30-minute drive of the Twin Ports, Duluth/Superior.

Mission Covenant Church was founded on May 8, 1894, with 22 charter members. In over 113 years of existence, we have experienced a lot of change. We have transitioned from a strictly immigrant, Swedish-speaking church, Swedish Mission Congregation, to an English-speaking church, Mission Covenant Church, in the mid 1930s.

We have also built three different church buildings, two on our previous site in downtown Poplar where we were located for 102 years. The other is our present location, one mile southeast of the village, which we moved into in 1996. Since then we have undergone a couple of building projects adding on to our new facility.

We have also undergone numerous constitutional revisions and ministry changes to remain viable in our ever-changing world. Through all the changes we have experienced, the Gospel of salvation through Jesus Christ and the Word of God remained constant. God has been faithful to us throughout our history!

Dr John S. Wenrich is the Director of Congregational Vitality for the Evangelical Covenant Church. His role is to help established churches confront their current reality with hope, honesty and faith. He also speaks at numerous conferences and retreats.

John grew up in the Philadelphia area. He graduated from Villanova University with a B.A. in Communications, has a Masters of Divinity from Denver Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry from Fuller Seminary. He is an ordained minister of the Evangelical Covenant Church.

Annual Meeting Preview – Veritas II: The Journey of Revitalization

Veritas got the conversation going. It encouraged us to confront our current reality with hope, honesty and faith. Now what? With a common language set in place, how can we move forward in becoming a healthy missional church? By healthy we mean pursuing Christ. By missional we mean pursing Christ's priorities in the world.

The good news is that God is already at work throughout the world and in our very own community. How does our church follow the Spirit wherever the Spirit leads? Knowing that the journey of revitalization is both adventurous and treacherous, how do we keep in step with the Spirit?

Dr. John Wenrich will be joining us for

our conference Annual Meeting to lead us through the next step of the journey and to tell us about the exciting developments in revitalization throughout the whole Covenant. He will help us discover valuable insights and

tools to create and sustain momentum, and will challenge us to join the growing movement of Covenant churches that are willing to ask the significant questions and take the significant steps to move forward into God's future.

A presentation to the ministerial association will be made on Friday morning. Two presentations will be given to the general delegation on Saturday morning. Churches are also encouraged to send additional leaders to the Saturday morning workshop with Dr. Wenrich.

January 2008 Friendship Place Update: 'They will know we are Christians by our love.'

riendship Place is a ministry of Northwest Conference churches and groups, collaborating with Covenant Ministries of Benevolence. Friendship Place will be a duplex group home residence in Lino Lakes, Minn., for eight adults with developmental disabilities.

The need for a Christian group home, where vulnerable adults have the opportunity to live in a supportive and caring environment, is great. Moreover, we believe that God is pleased when His people provide for families and individuals with needs. In Matthew 25:40 Jesus tells us, "Whatever you did for the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Covenant Ministries of Benevolence in Chicago is currently providing support and management in the planning and construction of Friendship Place. After delays due to the planning and approval process, we are on track to break ground in the spring of 2008. The exact timing will depend on the timing of further reviews and ap-

provals by the city of Lino Lakes.

Local fund raising efforts, combined with grants from Covenant Ministries of Benevolence and the Northwest Conference, have enabled us to raise \$330,000 thus far. These funds are sufficient to apply for a mortgage and begin construction.

However, in the past two years, there have been several cuts in state funding for the support of adults with developmental disabilities. Moreover, we anticipate further cuts in state funding, so it is imperative to continue fund raising efforts.

The goal of the Friendship Place Committee is to raise an additional \$100,000 to reduce the size of the mortgage. This will allow for much-needed funding for programming once the home is built. Please continue to pray and to give, as God lays this ministry on your heart.

The Friendship Place committee is also looking for the donation of a new or "lightly used" van, needed for transporting residents, beginning in the summer of 2008. Please contact Sharon Penner, chair of the Friendship Place Committee, if you know of someone who might be open to this possibility!

We are planning a groundbreaking celebration for Friendship Place this coming spring. Watch for news of this event, and come celebrate with us all what God has done, and will do, through the Friendship Place Covenant Enabling Residence ministry!
