INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANT'S REVIEW REPORT

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Northwest Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2022 and 2021, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements. Those standards require us to perform procedures to obtain limited assurance as a basis for reporting whether we are aware of any material modifications that should be made to the financial statements for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

We are required to be independent of Northwest Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our review.

NORTHWEST CONFERENCE BYLAWS

ARTICLE III Officers

Section 3.1. The Superintendent

d. Election. A two-thirds vote of the delegates present and voting at the Annual Meeting shall be required for election of the Superintendent. All voting shall be by written ballot. The election for the Superintendent will follow the same voting procedures as the Annual Meeting.

Should the candidate fail to receive the required vote, the position shall be filled temporarily under Section 3.1(I) of this article. A new nomination process for the permanent position shall proceed according to Section 3.1

ARTICLE IX The Annual Meeting of the Conference

Section 9.2. Delegates.

m. Delegates to the NWC Annual Meeting may participate in person or virtually, and given vote and voice accordingly. Voting may take place via written ballot or by electronic means with a printed written record.

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AMENDMENT TO

MINNEHAHA ACADEMY BYLAWS

Section 3.2 Number, Election/Appointment, Tenure, Qualifications

- a) **Classes of Trustees.** The Board of Trustees shall consist of <u>up to</u> twenty-eight (28) members and be elected as Trustees in one of the following manners: Elected by the Member; Elected by the Trustees; and Ex-Officio.
- b) Trustees Elected by the Member. Fifteen <u>Up to fifteen</u> (15) members of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation shall be elected by the Corporation's Member Each Trustee so elected shall serve staggered terms of five (5) years, such that three (3) Trustees shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Member, <u>and shall serve for terms of three (3) years</u>.
- c) Trustees Elected by Trustees. <u>Ten-Up to ten</u> (10) members of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation shall be elected by the affirmative vote of a majority of the Corporation's Trustees present at a duly held meeting, and shall serve for terms of <u>five three</u> (<u>53</u>) years.
- d) Ex-Officio Trustees. The ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation shall consist of the Superintendent of the Member, the President of the Corporation, and a liaison member of the Executive Board of the Member appointed by the Executive Board of the Member. Trustees who serve ex-officio shall remain Trustees for so long as they hold such position.
- e) **Trustee, Policies**. Each new Trustee shall participate in an orientation program. Each Trustee shall abide by a conflict-of-interest policy and a confidentiality policy.
- f) Number of Terms. At the completion of their first or second term, Trustees may be elected for another three-year term or shall rotate off the Board of Trustees. A Trustee may be elected to serve up to three (3) consecutive terms. At the end of a third consecutive term, a Trustee must rotate off the Board of Trustees for a period of at least one (1) year, with the exception of a former Board Chair, who may be elected by Corporation's Trustees to serve an additional one (1) year-term to assist the incoming Board Chair.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements *Opinion*

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Minnehaha Academy (a nonprofit organization) which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2022 and 2021, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Minnehaha Academy as of June 30, 2022 and 2021, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Minnehaha Academy's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due
 to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such
 procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures
 in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal controls relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an
 opinion on the effectiveness of Minnehaha Academy's internal control. Accordingly, no such
 opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Minnehaha Academy's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.
