APRIL 28, 2023

NWC VIDEO: Rooted in Hope Video - Part 1

CALL TO ORDER - JAMES VOLLING, NWC CHAIR

Northwest Conference (NWC) Chairperson Jim Volling called the meeting to order at 2:31 pm. He reflected on several scripture passages that remind us that our faith is grounded in hope. Chairperson Volling led in prayer.

HOST GREETING

Pastor Todd Ertsgaard welcomed the delegates and meeting attendees to Bemidji Covenant and to the Northwoods. Bemidji is the first city on the Mississippi River and home to Paul Bunyan and Babe the Blue Ox.

MINUTES FROM THE 2022 ANNUAL MEETING

The 2022 Annual Meeting minutes were reviewed and approved by the NWC Executive Board at its July 18, 2022 meeting. A motion was made to authorize the Northwest Conference Executive Board, on behalf of the delegates, to approve the Minutes of the 2023 Annual Meeting at the next formal meeting of the NWC Executive Board. There was a second and the motion carried.

ECC VIDEO

GREETINGS FROM THE EVANGELICAL COVENANT CHURCH

Marti Burger, Director of Vocational and Spiritual Development, expressed gratitude for the Northwest Conference, the place where she came to faith and received her call to ministry.

Rev. Burger brought greetings from the denomination and highlighted the 3 Strand Strong partnership between the church, the conference and the denomination. The work we do together is more than we could do alone. She invited us to join ECC President Tammy Swanson-Draheim in a season of prayer.

NORTHWEST CONFERENCE SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

Superintendent Kara Stromberg began her report by thanking delegates for joining together in our annual meeting celebration of God's work in our midst. She stated that ministry is bigger than the ministry of a single church.

Our denomination will be making some critical decisions at its upcoming annual meeting in June. Two churches, which are out of harmony, will be considered for involuntary removal. The vote is not to change our position on human sexuality, but rather to consider the recommendation of the Covenant Executive Board for removal from the roster of churches. Online delegates have been invited to Alexandria Covenant (Alexandria, MN) and Lakeview Covenant (Duluth, MN)

The NWC ministry priorities remain unchanged and are focused on Congregational Vitality, Church Planting, Children, Youth and Family, and the care and support of our pastors.

Church planting remains a priority. An interim church planting team has been formed to help strengthen new and existing church plants following a difficult few years of ministry. Our focus will shift temporarily from the starting of new congregations to coaching, resourcing, evaluating and implementing new ways to be more effective.

New initiatives include multi-ethnic leadership development and lay leader training, including finance team and board chair training.

Retiring board members Cindy Owen and Jim Volling were thanked for their years of service. And Mauricio Dell'Arciprete was recognized for his leadership with Latino ministries.

Superintendent Stromberg concluded her report with verses from Psalm 27 – "I remain confident of this. I will see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord."

NWC MINISTRY STAFF PANEL

Ministry staff joined the Superintendent. Each person was asked what brings them hope in their areas of ministry over-

sight. Opportunities to gather and learn, development of new and young leaders, our ability to provide resources, partnerships with churches and other ministries (including the ECC) which allow for greater ministry, the commitment of pastors to each other, and our ability to encourage.

Delegates were encouraged to submit questions which will be answered during the Saturday morning business session.

The Superintendent took a point of privilege to recognize Jon Kramka's leadership of AlL (Adventures in Leadership) for the past 20 years. She highlighted Jon's hands-on approach to teach and coach and his commitment to equipping next generations for godly leadership. A prayer was offered for AlL and for Jon.

PRAYER

Superintendent Stromberg led the delegates in a time of corporate prayer. Scripture passages were read to focus our attention on Adoration, Confession, Thanks and Supplication.

The meeting was adjourned.

WORKSHOPS

Delegates were dismissed to a time of learning. Workshops included:

- Your Mission, Your Community: The Six Critical Questions of Context led by Dr. Martin Giese
- We Love Our Church! How Do We Cultivate Pastoral Fortitude and Fruitfulness as a Church Staff led by Rev. Marti Burger
- Trauma Informed Youth Work led by Ash SanFilippo, Tree-House Ministries

WORSHIP CELEBRATION

Worship was led by a team of musicians from Bemidji Covenant. Six Candidates for Ordination in the Evangelical Covenant Church were recognized and prayed for. An offering was taken for the Bemidji Community Food Shelf. Rev. Colleen Nelson, pastor of Bethlehem Covenant Church, Minneapolis, MN, shared a message titled, "Rooted in God's Presence."

APRIL 29

Delegates and attendees gathered at 8:30 am for a time of worship, led by musicians from Bemidji Covenant. Pastor Galen Nordin, pastor of Lancaster Covenant Church, Lancaster, MN, encouraged all through his words of witness to remember that roots matter, foundations matters, and our commitment to the Bible as the only perfect rule for faith, conduct and doctrine ("Where Is It Written?") keep us rooted in hope. He closed by leading the assembly in My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less.

NWC VIDEO: Rooted in Hope Video – Part 2

Chairman Jim Volling called the meeting to order.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA FOR 2023 ANNUAL MEETING

It was brought to the Chairman's attention that the agenda had not yet been approved. A motion to approve the agenda was made and seconded. The motion carried.

NWC STAFF Q & A

Questions focused on church planting in the NWC, resources for senior adult ministry, discipleship resources for youth, and the upcoming vote at the ECC Annual Meeting to remove Awaken Covenant Church, St Paul, MN, from the roster of Covenant churches. Superintendent Stromberg closed this time in prayer, asking God to "lead and guide us in these hard times and to provide a way forward."

THE MISSION AND MINISTRY OF MINNEHAHA ACADEMY

A video was shown highlighting the Shine Line, a phone line created by this year's kindergartners to spread joy and encouragement through Bible verses, prayer and songs. President Donna Harris explained that The Shine Line is an example of the intentional core faith formation opportunities incorporated into the school's curriculum.

Minnehaha adopted a phone free policy at the beginning of the school year. This social experiment has encouraged greater connection at a time when authentic, strong relationships are essential in navigating the challenging times in which we live.

Good News: Enrollment continues to increase. Students continue to achieve as individuals and teams. The school continues to look for ways to partner with churches and pastors.

PRESENTATION AND VOTE ON AMENDMENTS TO MINNE-HAHA ACADEMY BYLAWS

Proposed changes to the Minnehaha Academy bylaws were presented at the 2022 annual meeting. The bylaw amendment changes the length of service for members of the Board of Trustees from 5 years to 3 years. The Northwest Conference Executive Board is bringing this motion to the delegates so a second is not required. No discussion. The motion carried.

PRESENTATION AND VOTE ON MINNEHAHA ACADEMY BUDGET

Mike Huray, Chief Financial Officer, reported that Minnehaha has received a clean audit for the fourth year in a row. Mr. Huray reviewed the financial reports on pages 15-17 in the Business Session Guide and he presented the FY2024 budget (page 18). This budget includes increased compensation and benefits for staff. The motion to approve the budget comes from the NWC Executive Board so a second is not required. No discussion. The motion carried.

CHANGES TO THE ROSTER

Churches to be deleted from the roster of churches include:

- Community Covenant Church, Lake Bronson, MN
- The Gallery Covenant Church (dba Last City Covenant Church), St Paul, MN
- Highland Community Church, Cokato, MN
- Evangelical Covenant Church, Rush City, MN
- Nueva Vida Covenant Church, Monticello, MN

Fellowship groups that have closed or withdrawn include:

- The Crossing Covenant Church (Houlton, WI)
- The Door Covenant Church (Blaine, MN)
- Genesis East Covenant Church (North St Paul, MN)
- Roots Covenant Church (St Paul, MN).

A motion was made and seconded to approve the removal of these five member churches and four fellowship groups from the roster of churches in the Northwest Conference. No discussion. The motion carried.

PRESENTATION AND VOTE ON AMENDMENT TO NWC BYLAWS

Proposed changes to the Northwest Conference bylaws were presented at the 2022 annual meeting. The bylaw amendment allows for online voting as well as voting by written ballot. The Northwest Conference Executive Board is bringing this motion to the delegates so a second is not required. Discussion followed with a concern for the integrity of executive session in a hybrid meeting. The motion carried.

PRESENTATION AND VOTE ON NORTHWEST CONFERENCE BUDGET

Dan Riley, NWC Treasurer, reviewed church giving for the last 5 years and reported on anticipated giving for the current year. Sandy Norris, Director of Finance, reviewed the financial reports on pages 7-9 in the Business Session Guide and presented the 2023/24 budget. The new budget includes reduced expenses in church planting and personnel as well as reduced church giving. The Executive Board and NWC staff will actively review and manage expenses to stay within income.

The motion to approve the 2023/24 budget was made by the NWC Executive Board. Discussion followed with concern expressed for a deficit budget and reduced church giving. The motion carried.

PRESENTATION OF THE NORTHWEST CONFERENCE BALLOT

Ballots were distributed. Nominees for the NWC Executive Board (5-year terms) are Rev. Dave Hugare, Lakeview Covenant, Duluth, MN; and Mike Mrosko, Excelsior Covenant, Excelsior. Nikki Kahoud, Rochester Covenant, Rochester, MN, is the Board Chair nominee (1 year term). Chairman Volling asked for nominations from the floor for the NWC Executive Board. No nominations were received. A motion to close the ballot was made and seconded. No discussion. The motion carried.

Nominees for the Minnehaha Academy Board of Trustees (3 year terms) are Dave Cairns, Epiphany Covenant, Minneapolis, MN; Milton Dodd, Plymouth Covenant, Plymouth, MN; and John Schroeder, Restoration Covenant, Lakeville, MN. Chairman Volling asked for nominations from the floor for the MA Board of Trustees. No nominations were received. A motion to close the ballot was made and seconded. No discussion.

The motion carried.

The delegates voted.

AFFILIATE MINISTRY REPORTS

Delegates and attenders heard from affiliate ministries in the Northwest Conference. Greetings and reports were given by: Phil Tolbert, Executive Director, Lake Beauty Bible Camp, representing the 5 camps in the Conference; Rachel Kleinschmidt, Women Ministries; Grant Wennerberg, Solid Rock School of Discipleship; Dana Norton, Covenant Ability Network; Jill Hall, National Covenant Properties; and Steve Allison, Covenant Trust Company. A video was shown highlighting the work of Covenant Benefits.

BALLOT RESULTS

Chairperson Volling presented the ballot results stating Rev. Dave Hugare and Mike Mrosko were elected to the NWC Executive Board and Dave Cairns, Milton Dodd and John Schroeder were elected to the MA Board of Trustees. Nikki Kahoud was elected as NWC Chairperson for a one-year term.

Chairperson Volling thanked Bemidji Covenant Church for their wonderful hospitality. He expressed his joy and privilege in serving the Northwest Conference for the past 10 years.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn. The motion carried.

Superintendent Kara Stromberg closed the meeting in prayer, giving thanks for current and newly elected board members.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANT'S REVIEW REPORT

To the Executive Board and Management Northwest Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church Minneapolis, Minnesota

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Northwest Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements. A review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of entity management. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements as a whole. Those standards require us to perform procedures to obtain limited assurance as a basis for reporting whether we are aware of any material modifications that should be made to the financial statements for them to be in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

We are required to be independent of Northwest Conference of the Evangelical Covenant Church and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our review.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Trustees and Finance Committee Minnehaha Academy Minneapolis, Minnesota

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Minnehaha Academy (a nonprofit organization) which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Minnehaha Academy as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are required to be independent of Minnehaha Academy and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Minnehaha Academy's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.
