# PRAYING FOR HARVEST WORKERS

Last year (2024) was my first as Associate Superintendent, and I focused on listening to our pastors, planters and church leaders. I have spoken in dozens of churches and multiple camps while working to strengthen the support for our clergy. I have visited each of our church plants, both English and Spanish speaking.

Having heard so many stories, dreams and plans, I believe what we need most is a focus on prayer—specifically praying Luke 10:2 together.

*“When Jesus saw the crowds, he had compassion on them because they were confused and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. He said to his disciples, ‘The harvest is great, but the workers are few. So pray to the Lord who is in charge of the harvest; ask him to send more workers into his fields’” (Matthew 9:38; Luke 10:2).*

## WHY DO WE START NEW CHURCHES?

**1. God is a sending God:** God so loved the world that He sent His Son (John 3:16). We follow Jesus to sacrificially send, and when this doesn't happen, discipleship becomes self-centered (or

our-church centered) and the view of our missionary God is distorted.

**2. We live on a mission field:** Different churches reach different people. Our country is growing larger and more diverse. New churches reach different languages, cultures and generations. The heart of the Covenant has been making disciples through sending missionaries and starting churches (John 20:21).

**3. We are compelled by Christ's compassion:** Christ had compassion on the lost sheep. Over half of America is

suffering from medical-grade loneliness, with anxiety growing especially among our kids and youth. Every new church is an outpost of hope, prioritizing reaching non-churched people, addressing needs and working for justice.

### 4. Healthy discipleship multiplies:

Jesus promised to make us fishers of men and women (Matt 4:19). Planting churches creates a holy desperation to reach lost people, deepen disciples and accelerate leadership development. Both the church plant and the sending churches are blessed by planting.

We are prayerfully working on two new projects for 2025. Hector and Pierina Calvo are launching a bi-lingual church plant. Chris and Elin Aldrich are co-pastoring a church of house churches. We are also having conversations with potential church adoptions and talking to potential church planters.

**Our hope is for every NWC church to be connected to starting new churches.** Please pray for how you can be part—prayer is the plow, and we plant behind the plow.

# STUDENTS ARE ENCOUNTERING JESUS

This past year has brought both momentum and challenges to NWC youth ministry. Relationships among youth leaders are deepening, students are encountering Jesus in powerful ways and there is a renewed focus on raising future leaders. In June, Adventures in Leadership challenged students through experiential learning on servant leadership at Adventurous Christians. On their first night in the BWCA, they faced a storm that tested their resilience, forming deep bonds.

In July, UNITE East brought 460 students and leaders from our Conference to Bowling Green, OH, for worship, connection and calling to ministry. Many churches worked hard to make this possible, and leaders expressed deep gratitude for the gathering. A few

weeks later, MUUUCE welcomed 435 middle schoolers to Buffalo Covenant for high-energy fun, worship and learning. As we build a rotational model of

host churches, Crossview Mankato will be our site this summer.

Leadership development remains a priority. In December, youth pastors gathered for the first Youth Ministry Leadership Summit, addressing the need to develop young leaders. Two working teams emerged—one developing a “Called to Ministry” cohort for high schoolers and the other creating a student leadership curriculum for churches. Meanwhile, the NWC youth pastor network is growing, offering peer support and fresh ideas. With many youth pastors in part-time or blended roles, we are exploring new ways to equip them. The future of NWC youth ministry is bright, thanks to committed leaders investing in the next generation.

# FAMILIAR AND NEW MINISTRY RHYTHMS

This past year of ministry has seen a sort of settling into both familiar and new ministry rhythms following the disruption of the pandemic. Most churches report the return of children and families to congregational life, though not always with the same attendance frequency as before the pandemic.

Pathways for discipleship are getting renewed attention, leading to ministry programs that are increasingly family focused. A return to intergenerational spaces for faith formation is shifting the visibility of children (and youth) in churches on a Sunday morning. This seems to be an emerging and welcome trend.

We continue to gather ministry leaders for community and resourcing. We had higher attendance at the

denominational NextGen conference than in previous years. There is steady attendance at monthly gatherings. A number of out-state trips provided connection with those who cannot make the drive into the Cities. In December, children’s ministry leaders enjoyed a day away for an Advent retreat led by the Rev. Anna Maloney of Bloomington Covenant.

We were able to restart the Children’s Ministry Commission to give specific direction toward resourcing leaders in the Conference. It continues to be an honor to collaborate with children and family ministry leaders and our churches! I look forward to additional opportunities to serve with so many gifted leaders!



# CLOSER AS CO-LABORERS

The current political climate presents unprecedented challenges for immigrant communities, yet our pastors and churches remain steadfast in evangelism, discipleship and pastoral care. Our shared struggles and successes have drawn us closer as co-laborers and deepened connections with the Conference staff.

Gathering regularly over meals, encouraging and connecting through prayer; Leveraging WhatsApp as a vital communication platform; Coaching Spanish-speaking church planters and pastors to strengthen ministry networks; Celebrating the licensing and ordination of two Spanish-speaking NWC pastors.

# SUSTAINING PASTORAL INTEGRITY

Jesus says: “I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me, and I in you, you will bear *much fruit*; apart from me, you can do *nothing*” (John 15:4-5). He continues in verse 16: “You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit—*fruit that will last ....*”

Hudson Taylor’s “Spiritual Secret” highlights Taylor’s simple, profound secret of “drawing for every need, temporal or spiritual, upon the ‘fathomless riches of Christ.’”

He daily practiced this drawing in his devotional time with God, fueling his life and ministry over 54 hard years in China’s interior. It has born lasting fruit in generations of faithful witness-

es for Christ, over 160 years through the Overseas Missionary Fellowship (OMF), now partnering with 2,500+ workers from over 40 nations serv-

ing more than 100 East Asian people groups.

In 2024, personal meetings with pastors, individually and in groups, and at the Fall Ministerial Association Retreat, promoted pastors’ long-term faithfulness and fruitfulness. Collaborative financial resourcing to clergy facing unexpected difficulties were welcomed by pastors who were appreciative of extra support. Veteran pastors engaged and are participating in the “Flourishing in the Third Third” cohort, furthering continued vibrancy in later years.

I’m hopeful our ongoing collaboration will promote much lasting fruit among NWC pastors. Praise God for his sustaining grace and generous provision.

# INCREMENTAL IMPROVEMENTS

Throughout 2024, we continued to make content and visual improvements to our branded communication tools—a process that began the previous year as a result of a staff audit. Most noticeably, we redesigned our weekly UPDATE emails with an aim to organize the information more clearly for our readers, while adding valuable new features from our staff like the monthly “What We’re Reading” column and quarterly video updates from the Superintendent’s office.

We also created a New Pastors Packet, with background information about our Conference and links to helpful resources to share with pastors being welcomed into the Northwest Conference. I continue to enjoy supporting MUUUUCE, the Rural Impact Leadership Conference, Celebration and many other NWC events and team members through promotional designs and the creation of new resources to support our ministry priorities.



# GOD USES SIMPLE ACTS OF SUPPORT

Highlights—Attending the Rural Impact Leadership Conference in March, ECC Gather in June, UNITE in July and MUUUUCE in August gave me the chance to see how God uses our planning and coordinating and simple acts of support to build up and encourage leaders and students to answer His call.

*“Rejoice always, Pray continually, give Thanks in all circumstances; for this is God’s will for you” (1 Thes. 5:16-18).*

# ALIGNING BUDGET TO MINISTRY PLANS

The recurring theme across the Northwest Conference churches this year has been the outrageous premium increases (and sometimes cancellation for no apparent reason) of insurance coverage.

Over 30 church leaders joined a Zoom meeting with Brad Hedberg, trusted Covenant friend and insurance broker, to talk about options and how we can work together toward reduced premiums.

There was and is no simple solution but we’re hopeful that there may be more negotiating power as policies renew. Brad is happy to do a no obligation, free insurance evaluation for any interested congregation.

Delegates will see a budget proposal that better aligns with Superintendent Stromberg’s strategic ministry plan this year. We’re excited to fully implement these changes.

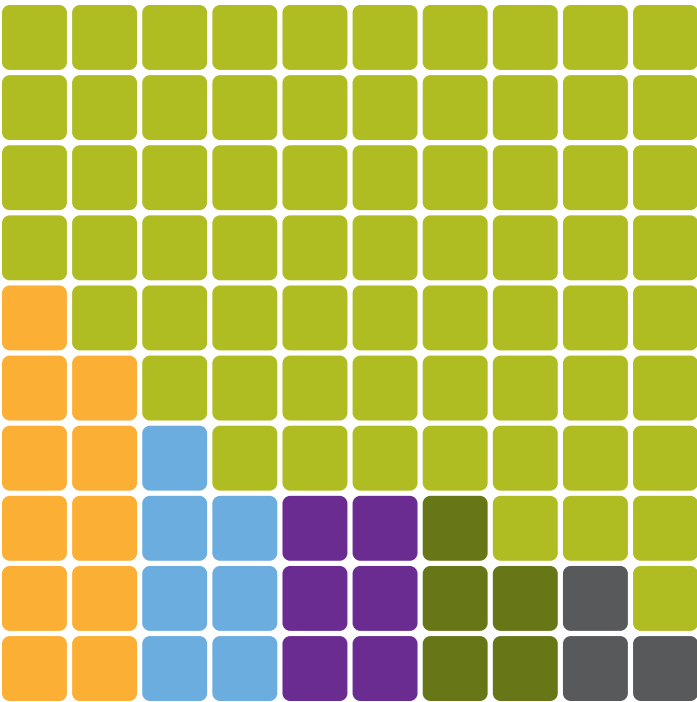

BUDGETED 2024/25 NWC SOURCES OF FUNDS:

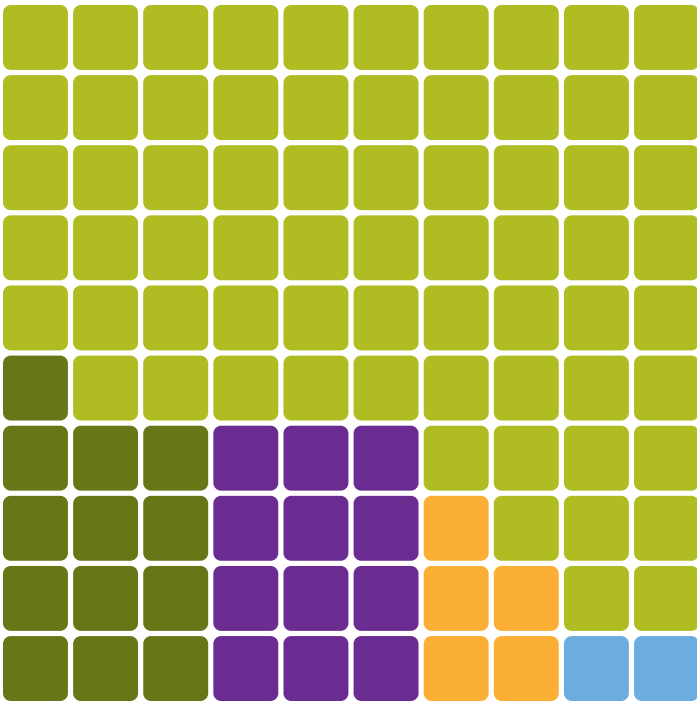

# FOUR CORE VALUES IN ACADEMIC LIFE

Minnehaha Academy's four Core Values are central to everything that we do- from classroom instruction to service projects. Here's a snapshot of how we lived out our Core Values in 2024.

**Exceptional Academics:** Students pursued truth and excellence in their work this year in a variety of ways from preschool to grade 12.

**A Closer Look at Academics: From NASA Meetings to Real-World Impact!** The Applied Research and Engineering class creates, from concept to completion, two experiments to send to the International Space Station (ISS) from the Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

Recently, they took their learning to a whole new orbit—literally! They met with NASA scientists at the prestigious American Society for Gravitational and Space Research Conference in Puerto Rico. They presented a groundbreaking research project that has real-world applications for space exploration.

**Distinctively Christian:** Students were invited to become authentic followers of Jesus Christ in a variety of ways, including student-led weekly chapels,

retreats, classroom experiences and Core Formation Experiences. Middle school, ninth and twelfth grade retreats at Covenant Pines are specific times designed to encourage students to grow in their faith.

**Cultivating Potential:** Growing each students' God-given gifts and talents is woven throughout the year. One way this happens is through the Middle School's Academic Formation Experiences. Students spent a week explor-

ing a single topic from multiple angles, learning how to dig deeply. Some encountered vocational possibilities that stirred up new passions.

**Caring Community:** We are unified through Christ and our care for each other. One way this is exemplified is in how we welcome new people into our community. In 2024, new Upper School student Alex noted, "I like how nice everyone is. If you don't have plans, people invite you to games or events."

## MINNEHAHA ACADEMY: A NORTHWEST CONFERENCE SCHOOL

Minnehaha Academy is ranked the #1 Christian High School in Minnesota. Founded by NWC pastors and lay leaders 113 years ago, Minnehaha Academy remains a vital ministry of the Northwest Conference.
